Six-year-old baking prodigy seeks help for studies

Jonah Michio Tan may only be six, but he's already an accomplished little baker who sells his cookies online through his own website. "Jonah Bakes"





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Not only that, Jonah, who suffers from the rare genetic condition of skeletal dysplasia – which makes it difficult for him to move about smoothly and results in his bone fracturing easily whenever he falls – hopes to own his own bakery one day.

The idea for Jonah Bakes came about one day when Jonah said to his mother: "Mummy, I want to be a baker, I really like to bake. Can I have my own bakery?"

"So we started Jonah Bakes to let him know that even though he may be different, and not able to run around and play like the other kids, he shouldn't give up on his dreams, " says his mother, Miyumi Yanagi, 30, a Malaysian of Chinese-Japanese descent.

"At least, if he works hard at this, he can be assured that he won't have to be dependent on others or the system when he grows up because he already has the foundation to earn a living, " says Yanagi, a single mother.

She reveals that her son first started baking when he was four.

"I would cook meals at home every day, and when I was in the kitchen, Jonah would always offer to help. Since he can't run and play like other kids, he would stay focused on his baking, " she says.

"Jonah's disability has never stopped him from doing what he enjoys, " she adds.



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Yanagi recently left her full-time job to focus on Jonah Bakes after her son expressed his hope to have a bakery of his own in the future.

"On my single income, I wouldn't be able to afford sending Jonah and his younger brother Jamian Minoru to daycare, paying for school fees and transportation, rental and utilities, " admits Yanagi.

"At least, now I can save on daycare and transportation costs, " she says.

"I'll also have more flexible time for my two boys and the bakery, since Jonah will be starting primary school this year, " she adds.



Yanagi reveals she initially had difficulties finding a school that would accept Jonah due to his condition.

"Most schools don't have the facilities to support children like him, " she says.

"There's the Integrated Special Education Programme (PPKI) class for children with learning disabilities but Jonah isn't mentally handicapped. He can learn like other children, but just has a physical condition. There's also the Inclusive Special Education Programme (PPI) where special needs children are taught together with other children, but the facilities just aren't built to support children like Jonah who would need assistance to get around and even to go to the toilet, " she explains.

She adds that although she considered homeschooling, she hasn't been able to find a homeschool that she can afford.

But with the help of FGA Cheras church pastor Robert Wong and its members, Jonah has been able to start studying (online during the second movement control order) at a learning centre in Petaling Jaya. "Our church and its members desire to help the poor, especially single mothers. So when Jonah's predicament was highlighted, we helped connect him to this learning centre in PJ where he will be studying on a trial basis for one month, " says Wong.

"He will go through diagnostic level testing to assess his suitability for homeschooling before proceeding with his education there," he says.

Wong adds that the church will also be sponsoring half of Jonah's monthly tuition fees and also his schoolbooks.

Love Cheras Care Services (LCCS), an NGO that does community work among the poor in Cheras, will be sponsoring the other half of Jonah's school fees for January.











"We're very blessed and this means a whole lot to us. Last year, we were worried how to proceed with Jonah's studies, " says Yanagi.

She tearfully expresses her gratitude to all those who have supported and helped them during this time: "We're more than grateful to find out there's a school that's not only willing to accept Jonah but also to sponsor him and provide a place where he can learn, as well as school books."

But Yanagi says this is just the beginning. She hopes to make Jonah Bakes a platform to provide opportunities for the disabled in Malaysia.

"We understand how difficult it is to be differently-abled in Malaysia, and the opportunities can sometimes be so limited. So we'd like to use Jonah Bakes as a platform to help others who love to bake and are different like Jonah, " she says.

"We're going to get other disabled bakers to help bake the cookies on weekdays and Jonah can help bake during weekends after his studies," she adds.

She is currently looking for a place with the right facilities, mainly, it has to be wheelchair-friendly so that others with disabilities can come together and be part of it.

"It's a win-win situation because we do need help with the baking. Currently, it's just three of us, and once Jonah and Jamian start schooling, it will be more difficult, " she says.

"It's also an opportunity to give back to the disabled community," she adds.

Yanagi also plans to hold workshops and classes for disabled children who seek a career in baking. They will also try to cater to cafes and restaurants in the future.

Just a happy child

Even with all the hospital visits and blood tests that he has had to go through, and still not being able to have a full diagnosis of his condition to date, Jonah is a happy child.

"He always looks on the bright side. He loves to sing and dance, and has a good sense of rhythm, " says Yanagi. "Jonah also helps around the house, and takes care of his younger brother, Jamian, " she adds.

Jonah confidently chips in to say that this Chinese New Year, he's baking and selling crispy salted egg cornflake cookies, Lucky 8 vanilla cookies, peanut butter cookies, and pineapple tarts, and that his best

"We didn't expect Jonah Bakes to do so well. We thought it would be just family and friends buying the cookies, but we're really blessed and where there's a will, there's always a way, " she concludes. Jonah will be taking orders for the CNY cookies via the website until the end of Chinese New Year.
